Intact but fracked? Petroleum tank SPFD Engine dispatched to give explodes, two receive minor injuries mutual aid for Yolo County Cold Fire

A petroleum tank that was reportedly repaired about six months ago exploded Friday, slightly injuring two people and rattling windows—and, in at least one case, knocking the pictures off the wall — at residences in the rural area between Santa Paula and Ojai.

The fire occurred about 8:35 a.m. in an oil field near Highway 150 and Topa Lane, about a quarter-mile from county Fire Department Station 20, according to the Ventura County Fire Department and near Summit School.

The tank suffered a vertical explosion through the top of the 15-foot-tall tank, not an outward one. The 12-foot-wide tank's walls remained intact, largely containing the flames inside while Ventura County Firefighters prepared the surrounding area for spillover. Initially believed to be holding 5,000 gallons the tank had 1,782 gallons of what neighbors said is unprocessed, toxic fracked crude oil.

Two people who were near the exploding tank — believed to be workers on the private property on which the tank is located suffered minor injuries and were treated at the scene and released.

Area resident Carol Holly, who posted on the CFROG (Citizens For Responsible Oil & Gas) blog, said at the height of the fire "flames

were shooting out of it in recurrent blasts," and "intensified in size, shooting into the air 30-50 feet," or even more.

Firefighters had to stand by and let the tank burn itself out. Holly said by 9:45 a.m. "The tank began to show signs of melting because the flames were spilling over the sides from time to time. Just after 10 a.m.," it looked like the tank might explode "or melt away" as engines closest to the tank began to retreat while firefighters began pulling hoses into position near the base of the tank.

"Suddenly," said Holly, "the whole tank imploded in a white hot rush of flames. The flames were larger and taller than any we had seen to this point," an explosion that lasted for about a minute before the fire "simply collapsed into a small amount of smoke."

Firefighters from throughout

Ventura County have been dispatched to wildfires raging across the state including help from the Santa Paula Fire Department.

According to Santa Paula Department Fire Chief Rick Araiza, Engine 82 staffed by Captain Austin Macias, Engineer David Leon and Firefighter Brian Eaton were dispatched Wednesday August 3 to the Cold Fire in Yolo County.

Araiza said, "They made the trip as part of a mixed strike team with Ventura City, Oxnard, Fillmore and Ventura County," fire departments.

There are four wildfires burning in California: Santa Paula had also sent a engine company to the Sand Fire in Santa Clarita and the others being fought are the Soberanes Fire near Big Sur in Monterey County and the Goose Fire in Fresno County.

According to state Cal Fire, as of Saturday morning the Cold Fire had burned 5,385 acres and was 35 percent contained. More than 1,600 firefighters and about 200 pieces of equipment, from

engines and dozers to air tankers and helicopters are fighting the blaze. The cause of the fire is still under investigation.

The Soberanes Fire in Monterey County has burned more than 55,600 acres and is 40 percent contained. There has been one fatality and 57 homes have been destroyed. More than 2,000 structures are still threatened by the fire that was started by a

campfire.

The Sand Fire, which began July 22, is 98 percent contained and claimed the life of a Sand Canyon resident; it destroyed 19 homes and burned more than 41,000 acres of the Santa Clarita Valley and surrounding mountains. The estimated cost of fighting the Sand Fire — which brought evacuated to dogs CARL on Mission Rock Road — is \$35 million.

The River Rock/Hardison residential development will be presented to the City Council at the August 15 meeting where they will consider fewer homes with bigger lots on the historic property, located at 1226 Ojai Road.

The meeting, marking the end of the council's long hiatus, will start at 6:30 p.m. at City Hall, 970 E. Ventura St.

The council will be asked to approve 44 new houses on the property — nine less than the original Williams Home plan and five less than what was approved by the Planning Commission — on the 19.27acre Hardison House property.

According to the plans, the historic Hardison House, built in 1884, will remain in place and the 1885 barn will be relocated and converted into a garage for the residence on a two-thirds acre lot. Two other structures will be demolished.

New to the subdivision is an extended parkway across the entire front of the development, offering views of the historic house and barn to passersby on Santa Paula-Ojai Road.

The lower 10 acres of the 19.18 acre parcel will be

subdivided into 44 additional residential and three common area lots. The one- and twostory single-family homes will feature four architectural styles. The 9.18 acres hillside will be open space and a walking trail maintained by an HOA for use by residents.

In May the Planning Commission split 3-2 after a cantankerous meeting — the commission's second on the River Rock development attended by those opposing the plan, whom offered comment questioning density, water, traffic, historical aspects and other facets of the project. Several urged reusing the Hardison House as a public

The house was built for Wallace Libbey Hardison, a co-founder of Union Oil and Limoneira Co. who was also an early owner-publisher of the now defunct Los Angeles Herald Examiner.

The August 15 meeting will be broadcast live on Time Warner Cable Channel 10 and replayed according to schedule. It will also be streamed live on the city's website and archived for viewing on demand.

Calpine: More comments on proposed peaker plant from CEC meeting

Air pollution, water quality and quantity, noise, visual blight, water, environmental injustice, river restoration and more were cited by the more than 60 speakers at the July 28 second scoping and informational hearing on the proposed Calpine Mission Rock Energy Center.

The meeting of the California **Energy Commission drew more** than 300 people who wanted to learn more and comment on the proposed Calpine peaker plant. The facility is proposed for a 9.8acre parcel placed between the Todd Road Jail to the west and the Santa Clara Waste Water-Green Compass facility — the scene of chemical explosions and fires in November 2014 causing a countywide emergency — to the east.

The informational meeting is an early step in the process by the state commission that will end with a final decision next fall at the earliest as explained by Hearing Officer Susan Cochran.

The peaker plant will contain five combustion turbine engines with exhaust stacks that are 60 feet tall. Construction of the plant will also require a new electric transmission line across Highway 126 to the Wells Road area, gas pipeline and recycled water pipeline.

The recycled water used for the operation would come from the Limoneira wastewater treatment facility. Construction of the \$300 million facility would take about two years, require about 175 construction workers and thereafter employ 16 full-time workers.

The \$300 million project would general \$3 million in annual property tax with about halfgoing to Briggs Elementary and Santa Paula High School, Blanchard Community Library and the fire district. The county would pocket the balance.

Only three people, union representatives, spoke in favor of the project noting the area needs job opportunities.

Santa Paula City Councilwoman Ginger Gherardi spoke of visual blight and noise, noting the configuration of the river valley would generate heightened sound from the engines.

"How much noise does five jet engines make? How would you measure it in a bowl," such as the river vallev.

"My most basic concern is where is the justification... just because Calpine owns the property," does not mean it is the ideal location for such a facility.

Gherardi said her understanding is that the project was not solicited by

SCE or the CEC and rather is being build on speculation.

"I can't understand why anyone would put a power plant in the flood plain," and she noted "It's incredible to me it would even be considered for that location."

Gherardias did other speakers spoke of the November 2014 Santa Clara Waste Water-Green Compass chemical explosions and fires that left two firefighters permanently injured by toxic exposure.

She questioned how CEC would guarantee that the proposed peaker plant would not leak or chemicals would be spilled or swept into the Santa Clara River and into the water tables.

The facility would be a hazard to Santa Paula Airport commuters who in the last five years have experienced three fatalities from "Planes hitting regular power lines...who is going to assume the liability," for transmission lines rising higher than normal power lines, up to 200 feet.

Gherardi, asdidmany speakers also noted environmental justice and she questioned why the river valley and Santa Paula, "A low income agricultural community" has become home to unwanted

The CEC's own mandate said former Mayor Dr. Gabino Aguirre is to guard against any applications "that threaten health and welfare of our communities" and not to approve "A predatory profit maximizing venture," whose only goal is money.

Climate change must be considered as well as state requirements for renewable energy and "This project serves no purpose but to turn a profit."

The proposed project is an example of "Environmental injustice" and the CEC must acknowledge "Santa Paula as a community that needs your protection," as is their mandate.

Former Mayor Mary Ann Krause noted the Santa Paula Alliance has been formed to oppose the project that threatens the Santa Clara River, "The last natural flowing river in California."

The Nature Conservancy is restoring riverbanks and Krause said the flood history of the area including in 2005 when a portion of the Santa Paula Airport was washed away shows the nature of the river and belies the applicants plant to raise the property with fill above the flood plain.

That alone she noted, "Should be considered a fatal flaw and incompatible," with longstanding restoration efforts.

Aretired Air Pollution Control District engineer Karl Krause told the commission "My primary concern is this is the wrong time in history," to build such a plant.

"I sincerely hope," he noted, "that Santa Paula will not become the last place in California," with an energy source built that contributes to global warming and creates pollutants.

John Brooks, president of $CFROG\,(Citizens\, for\, Responsible$ Oil & Gas) said the organization has joined with the Santa Paula Alliance and others, "united against this misguided attempt" to construct the peaker plant.

He noted alternate energy options and said, "If you were going forward with projects people actually want they would be cheering you leading a parade down Harvard Boulevard."

Helen Conly of CFROG agreed, and asked, "How many similar proposals for plants in California have been denied by your commission? You should put that on your website so we know the criteria to deny. We often find these projects are mitigated to

death and we would like to know one that has actually been denied and their locations. Please tell us that."

Calpine has been involved in litigation said Linda Livingston who noted "Putting natural in front of gas does not make it clean...'

She said information not presented during the slide show includes lawsuits, multimilliondollar settlements, fires, energy gouging penalties, false and misleading statements to investors, and other incidents that the commission should be aware of.

Eco-tourism could be the future of Santa Paula said Audrey Vincent noting a river restoration credited for creating \$200 million annual revenue from visitors.

Vincent said the Nature Conservancy is envisioning a Santa Clara River promenade to the ocean that would create eco-tourism and boost the local economy.

As the mother of young children Sushila Wood said "money talks" in siting such plants.

shut down by the dozens in Great Britain and Germany: "This is California, we are proud and on the cutting edge of what is green and good in this country," and must emulate others to be on the cutting-edge of alternate power.

Santa Paulans "of lower economic means" have higher rates of respiratory ailments said Charles Spink which would be made worse by the peaker plant.

He noted that by the time the Calpine project is built and online "it will be obsolete" and he questioned the demonstrated need for the capacity.

Bob Borrego introduced himself as a "90-year resident of Santa Paula," and he noted "our beautiful city" has an 80 percent Latino population, "mostly farmworkers," and is the second poorest in the county.

With other challenges Santa Paulans are attempting to overcome Borrego urged the commission "please do not burden our community with a project that will bring misery to our lives. Farmworkers are the most exploited workers in

Gas and coal plants are being California," and the commission must not discriminate against them.

RonWhitehurst of VC Climate Hub said the demand for power generated by the Calpine plant will come from states outside California now decommissioning coal and nuclear plants who participate in the new regional power grid promoted by CalISO.

Lucia Marquez of CAUSE presentedapetitionsignedbymore than 1,000 area residents opposing the peaker plant, signatures she told the commission had been gathered in a month.

Santa Paula is a predominantly Latino immigrant and low-income community," that Marquez said "is targeted by corporations," seeking to build projects not wanted — or allowed - elsewhere.

Several speakers spoke through a translator and numerous children took to the podium objecting to the plant, one child submitting a speaker card made out in green crayon.

It is expected there will be another CEC meeting in mid-September.



Recology: Pick-ups delayed due to Free Movie in the Park to feature aging trucks but Drop-Off went well Disney's 'Zootopia' on August 19!

Aging equipment is being blamed for the recent series of solid waste pickup delays by Recology Ventura whose personnel has been fielding calls about filled cans left at the curb.

In some cases it has taken several days for pickups with the schedule staggered for solid waste, recycling and green waste.

According to Ruben Zaragoza, Recology's government and community relation's manager, they are hoping to correct the problem

"Because the trucks are older it takes a little bit of time to get the parts we need," the main factor for the delays, "and have routes done in a timely manner. We're also in the process of bringing in additional resources to help assist our trucks in a week or so," Zaragoza said Thursday.

"We've been receiving calls and addressing the situation as best as we can but how long it will continue at this point we don't have an estimate."

In February 2015 the City Council agreed to transfer the franchise contract for solidwaste collection from Crown

In addition, Recology purchased Crown's equipment and hired the existing staff, for the most part former city employees who moved to Crown when it purchased the solid waste division in 2011.

The hauler shares space with the City's Public Works on the ground floor of the Odd Fellows Lodge on East Main Street.

At the time the contract was let interm PublicWorks Director Brian Yanez said it had been emphasized to the company the city's expectations of customer service and community support.

In February 2015, Yanez told the council that Crown "Did a lot of extra things that are not in the franchise agreement," that Recology has agreed to continue.

The community has been communicating with Recology with complaints that Zaragoza said, "We are addressing as best as we can...we're in the process of playing catch-up."

When Recology purchased Crown, "We inherited the trucks from a company that had inherited the trucks from the city of Santa Paula...we are operating with older machinery,"

Disposal to Recology, based in that Zaragoza said takes time to repair as, "Parts can take weeks. So we are in the process of trying to pick up in a timely manner.

"We sincerely apologize for what's going on and we are working hard to address the issue in a timely manner."

Although picking up has not been going as planned the good news for Recology is the recent Santa Paula Drop-Off Event was a success, including recycling mattresses and box springs known to clog landfills and alleyways.

The five members of the City Council serve four-year terms and are compensated with a \$300 monthly stipend as well as more than \$1,000 each month that can be used for the city's cafeteria health plan, private insurance or pocketed.

Deputy City Clerk Lucy Blanco also pulled papers to run for the City Clerk seat now held by Judy Rice, whose second term is coming to an end. No one else has filed.

CityTreasurer Sandy Easley, the city's finance director, is also up for reelection and she pulled nomination papers, as did newcomer Rod Baltazar.

There are nine potential candidates for the five-member Santa Paula Unified School District Board of Trustees. Incumbents Michelle Kolbeck, Kelsey Stewart, Christina "Tina" Urias and Board Chair Chris Wilson all pulled papers, but incumbent Diana Ponce-Gomez has not yet done so.

Newcomers Eddie Arguelles, Jeri Mead, Pamela Thompson, and Derek Luna, have all pulled nomination papers as has Tim Hicks, a veteran of the now defunct Santa Paula Elementary School Board who lost his bid for the unified board.

The district will have a rare five-member race with the terms of all incumbents ending at the same time, the result of the unification of the high school and elementary school districts and the board election two years ago.

The highest three vote getters will serve full four-year terms with the two runner-ups twoyear terms. Those elected to the short terms will be required to run again in two years for a full four-year term to ensure the board terms are staggered.

SPPD: Information sought in Friday multiple shooting of area transient

An area transient is in intensive care after being shot Friday evening, an attack Santa Paula Police are asking for public input to help them in identifying a possible suspect.

According to SPPD Sgt. Cody Madison, at 9:11 p.m. August 5, "Officers were dispatched to a gunshot victim in the riverbed area in the 1700 block of East Telegraph

Upon the arrival of police they "discovered a gunshot victim, a 47-year-old male transient, who had been shot twice," about an hour before the report of the attack had been made.

Santa Paula Fire EMTs and ambulance personnel also responded to the scene and treated the unidentified victim before he was transported to Ventura County Medical Center. Once at VCMC the victim underwent emergency surgery.

After the surgery the victim was transferred to Intensive Care Unit where Madison said he was listed in serious condition.

The victim was reached from the Lemonwood Road area said Madison after his son, who is not

a transient, called to report his father had been shot.

The SPPD is familiar with the victim: "He is one of our known transients," said Madison.

The victim he noted, "Was shot in the torso and then in the buttocks...

Although the victim was cooperative and able to give police a short description of the attacker, "He was in such pain" that SPPD Detective Walter Harper, had to wait until Monday to conduct a full interview.

'At this time the investigation is ongoing," and Madison asked that those with any information to contact Harper, 805-525-4474 x 221 or at wharper@spcity.org


