

Students Pledge to be “Junior Recologists”

Nearly 60 students pledged to live a more sustainable lifestyle and became newly minted “Junior Recologists.” Last week’s presentation at the Boys and Girls Club of Santa Paula was hosted by Recology, a resource recovery company, and taught students the value of protecting the environment.

Simone Blackwell, Waste Zero specialist, started the presentation by telling students a Junior Recologist is, “a person who protects the environment by recycling, reusing items, and reducing the waste he/she creates.”

“[The students are] always so receptive and so interested in recycling and so excited to take care of the environment,” Blackwell said. “It’s great [Recology] has created a program that really taps into having people take care of the environment from such a young age.”

Melissa Heitz, Waste Zero manager, also helped with the presentation saying that children are their number one resource because they go home and educate the entire family on recycling.

Blackwell asked students if they knew how to recycle and hands shot up in the air telling her about how you can recycle cans, bottles and other items. Blackwell continued by telling students how their trash ends up in landfills after its placed in a bin and the issues associated with them, such as land and air pollution. The limited space in landfills is resulting in more being opened up and continuing to be filled with trash.

The biggest goal for the Junior Recologists is to prevent recyclable materials from ending up in landfills by using the three R’s: reduce, reuse and recycle.

Blackwell told students they can use less plastic bottles, napkins and other items that aren’t always necessary or have an alternative. Students offered up creative ideas for reusing items like using a plastic fork as a shovel. They were

told what items they could and couldn’t recycle and were then given a test.

Brown bags, containing different materials such as bottles, Styrofoam cups, plastic utensils and chip bags, were passed around for the students to evaluate in groups. Blackwell then called them up to either put their materials in the trash or the recycle bin.

“It’s always fun to educate somebody on something that they didn’t previously know,” Blackwell said. “Even if they guess it incorrectly, it’s still great that I’m there to now teach them what the correct way is to recycle.”

A couple of recycling videos were shown to give students a visual idea of where trash and recycling ends up. After, they were ready to take the pledge and become official Junior Recologists.

They just needed to take all of their new recycling knowledge and fill out their names on a bookmark which said, “I, [name] pledge to reduce the waste I create. Reuse items before throwing them

away. Recycle all recyclable materials. Educate others on how to reduce, reuse, recycle.”

The Junior Recologist Program was developed about a year ago and is being implemented in the Los Angeles area as well as Santa Paula.

“We’ve got a three-bin system [in Santa Paula] so it’s really nice to have access to that,” Heitz said. “The loads that are going in to be recycled are pretty clean so we know that all the education and outreach that we do throughout the community is working.”

Alejandra Villa has vivid memories of the 1928 St. Francis Dam Disaster

A Santa Paulan curious about the impacts on her family from the March 12-13, 1928 St. Francis Dam Disaster sharply remembers the night and days following the collapse after her home was swept away.

And Alejandra Villa, born November 1922 and then 5 years old, even knows exactly what was going on in her 242 S. 7th St. household those minutes before midnight when the dam catastrophically collapsed: she was refusing to go to bed, causing her mother to wake her father so he could reason with his child.

Living in a tidy house on West Santa Paula Street with many photos and plaques of dogs, her pets over the years, and more sleeping nearby, Alejandra is now 93.

“I just wondered,” she said, “how long we were out of our family home,” following the dam collapse, the second deadliest disaster in California after the 1906 San Francisco Earthquake.

At least 431 people were killed in the disaster after the dam, located at St. Francisquito Canyon in Los Angeles County, heaved and fell apart just days after it had been declared full to the brim with more than 12 billion gallons of water.

Although the dam collapsed just minutes before midnight, word did not reach Santa Paula that the floodwaters were on their way until about 1:30 a.m.

“I was behaving so badly that night my mother said ‘Herman, get up. I can’t do a thing with your daughter.’ He came to me and calmed me down, he was an angel...at about this time there was a knock on the door.”

Alejandra remembers “vividly” how her father Herman Villa, a foreman at the Santa Paula Citrus Association (SPCA), opened it to find his brother, Felipe standing on the doorstep.

Felipe told his brother about the collapse and urged him to evacuate.

“He told Father, ‘Take my car’ and all the children,” six in all as well as the grandparents who also lived nearby, “ ‘and get out of here...my wife and I will run for it.’ ”

Herman and Guirma gathered up their children, the

elders and fled to higher ground at Santa Paula High School.

When daylight came, family friend Francisco Gomez, also a SPCA foreman, took Alejandra and Herman to see the damage to their home.

“I remember the house was off the foundation but a fence caught it,” so it remained on the property, marks on the interior walls showing the water had reached 3-feet-deep.

“Of course,” said Alejandra with a laugh, “at this point I was the angel that saved my family!” her misbehavior now a positive because she had the household up and more ready to evacuate.

The day after the disaster “Everything was very fresh from the flood, there was mud all over. I saw things my sisters and brothers didn’t see, or they forgot about it.”

“I remember a sea of mud... no one was allowed on 12th Street,” closed as many other areas were.

“One house was in the middle of the street, a palm tree on the ground, we could not cross Harvard Boulevard,” then known as River Street.

Floodwaters said Alejandra, rose to just below the Ebell Clubhouse at the corner of 7th and Main.

“I remember Dad holding my hand and me looking out at this mud scene. It’s amazing how much I remembered for a 5-year-old!”

The extended Villa family stayed at the Santa Paula Citrus Association Camp on Citrus Street with other evacuees for months while work was done on their houses and flood damage claims processed.

“My Uncle Felipe also worked for the citrus company, he was higher up than my father,” and the camp was pleasant for the children.

“I remember there were outhouses that we played on top of, we all played blowing bubbles, would cut the stems off pumpkins to blow the bubbles from soapy water, there was no school,” due to flood damage.

Said Alejandra, “We had more fun...it was like an adventure to the kids, we didn’t realize at that point how serious it was. There were big boulders all over,”

ST. FRANCIS:
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Fillmore City Hall meeting focuses on medical marijuana

Fillmore City Hall was jammed Monday for a special meeting where numerous residents told the City Council why they were for or against easing a local ban on medical marijuana.

The meeting also featured presentations by law enforcement and advocacy groups that all seemed to agree that medical marijuana has its place, but split on whether or not that place should be Fillmore whose council is considering adopting a tax on same.

The public hearing on whether the council should allow cultivation, sale and delivery of medical marijuana, did not end until after 11 p.m.

Several people spoke about marijuana sales in Colorado and Washington where recreational sales are allowed.

Fillmore, like Santa Paula and other cities throughout the state hurriedly approved their own ordinances to beat a California law that would have enabled the state to license growers and sellers. The state deadline was

later dropped.

The council voted unanimously last month to place a measure on the November 8 ballot that would allow it to tax marijuana sales at a rate of up to 15 percent, the first such measure in the county.

Possession and use of marijuana with a doctor’s recommendation is protected under state law and cannot be banned by local authorities that do have the power to ban or regulate growth, sales and deliveries.

“It was a very informative meeting,” said Santa Paula Mayor Martin Hernandez who attended with Councilman John Procter.

“We wanted to hear the pluses and minuses,” of medical marijuana operations, and, “It was clear to us after Sheriff Geoff Dean spoke and others about the pitfalls that we’re not entirely ready here in Ventura County.”

Hernandez said there is “no way” the Santa Paula City Council can “even begin to have discussions” until they are better educated as a group and he would “strongly advocate we do the same thing here in Santa Paula, have a

special council meeting dedicated to medical marijuana policy.”

At Monday’s meeting Sarah Armstrong of Americans for Safe Access addressed the growing approval of medical marijuana starting with the Compassionate Use Act of 1996.

New legislation expected to garner voter approval in November will loosen laws even more said Armstrong, who noted that pharmaceutical companies are firmly against all such measures and work on local levels against medical marijuana laws.

“Legitimate businesses,” are not interested in selling marijuana to children and the location of dispensaries could be tightly controlled as well as other aspects of local ordinances.

“The best applicants are local applicants,” who have ties and respect for community.

After more discussion Armstrong noted that the strongest reason to support medical marijuana is the patient, “Always very, very thankful,” to be able to acquire the product.

Colorado Springs attorney Charles Houghton said he does

not use marijuana medically or recreationally; he served on a state task force to find out the impacts of cultivation, sales and dispensaries.

“If you do it properly with proper zoning what happens isn’t really very much,” said Houghton, who noted that “Colorado Springs was voted the fifth best place to live,” with Denver, “The only place with more dispensaries,” selected the number one place to live.

“It’s a witch hunt without a witch and when you do it right there are no negative impacts,” on the community.

If Fillmore did decide to go further Houghton offered to help them establish government and business guidelines and policies.

Attorney Lisa Selan has worked extensively in medical marijuana and said that city councils can put tight controls on such operations including mandating local hiring.

A representative of the District Attorney’s Office urged the council to remember the key word is “responsibility” in making

deposited by the floodwaters, and “we used to climb up on them and sit.”

People, she noted, “Didn’t talk much about the flood after it happened. Dad would make boxes for our pictures, wooden boxes we would play with then the flood destroyed all that,” but not the memories the photos held.

Reading about the disaster recently, Alejandra grew curious about how long her family had been displaced, and Ann Stoddard Stansell, a founding member of the CSUN Forgotten Casualties Project and author of “Memorialization and Memory of St. Francis Dam Disaster of 1928” offered help.

Stansell located the Villa’s personal possession claim and settlement, although not information about the time it took to fix the Villa home itself.

The family received \$362.50 for their personal possessions lost in the flood, a figure reached after depreciation and Red Cross replacements were factored in. The original claim had been for \$729.78.

Alejandra’s father was noted in the claim to be of excellent character and trustworthiness.

The claim was signed off on June 26, 1928 and the check for personal property was dated August 8, 1928.

Alejandra believes the family was back home on 7th Street shortly thereafter, “Because I started first grade in September 1928...when I first started school I could not speak English but soon I could recite the alphabet backwards!”

The Villa family, which had originally settled in Santa Paula in 1900, had many friendships throughout the city including with Thornton Edwards, known as The Hero of the St. Francis Dam Disaster, who became Chief of Police in 1929.

Known as a jokester, Edwards — a former and future actor “Very well liked by the people” — would entertain the adults and children alike with his antics.

“There a was pond there at Ebell Park that was stocked with pollywogs, it was nice, had a little bridge. When we would be playing there and Mother called ‘Chila! Chila!’ — that was my nickname, I don’t where she got it — pretty soon Thornton would start imitating her,” calling for Alejandra in a falsetto voice that sounded just like her mother’s.

Alejandra noted SPPD Officer Stanley Baker, who had ridden with Edwards, then a State

Motor Cycle Officer on the night of the dam collapse, had lived on her street.

“I have a lot of good memories, some sad, some bad,” she said of growing up in The Glen City, as Santa Paula was often called.

“I can remember what my second grade teacher wore down to the belt and cashmere sweater,” said Alejandra, and she also remembers school enrollment for her non-English speaking brother who was challenged, although her mother made sure he attended the next year.

Alejandra also remembers the days when at the movie theater, “Mexican people sat on the right, poorer whites sat on the left and the white rich ranchers and others sat in the middle.”

When Santa Paula Airport opened in 1930, a Zeppelin dropped bags of candy onto walnut trees where Stanford Street is now, and she had to get more for her siblings.

“We saw sad times and troubled times, the Great Depression was hard, but I had fun and I’m a very happy person. I’ve had a very eventful life...no wonder I’m happy about it!”

She and “My younger sister Laura,” are the only ones now left, said Alejandra, who noted although at 89 Laura is “Not well, she’s still very sharp...”

Alejandra never had children

but is surrounded by nieces and nephews, including painter Theodore Villa of Santa Barbara whose works decorate her home.

Her first husband, Pete Moreno, an airplane machinist she married in 1948, died in 1972 and three years later she married Joe Villa, regaining her last name.

“Everybody knew Joe,” Alejandra’s date for her SPHS junior prom.

Alejandra served as Santa Paula Deputy City Clerk in the 1940s: “City Hall was an old Army barracks when I worked there,” and later she served in the same capacity for the City of Hawthorn, where she and Moreno had settled, as well as deputy city treasurer.

But Santa Paula was always her home and the house she moved to in 1975 shows Alejandra’s designerside, including the custom tile and brickwork throughout the house and property that she laid herself.

“I always loved Santa Paula and always thought it was a special place. I can see the mountains and the orchards and all that stuff...I love my house, I’ve had a swell life here.

“This is home, even though I married and moved away then I was widowed and came back to Santa Paula.

“It is,” said Alejandra, “my home...”

any decisions and he cautioned that once the medical marijuana is sold there is no guarantee it will be used by the patient and not a child.

He noted that dispensaries and deliveries bring crime but profit is the driving force, not those needing marijuana for medical purposes.

Sheriff Dean told the council that a University of Colorado researcher found that the state’s legalization of marijuana has led to growing crime rates, a higher rate of youth drug addiction and rising mental health needs.

“Now, when you smoked in the 70s, and I’m not going to ask who did it,” marijuana had a lower THC level of up to 7 percent, “now

close to 95 percent...this is from an advertisement in Colorado,” that Dean showed as part of a PowerPoint presentation.

Dean noted, “If someone has a legal medical reason I personally don’t have an issue with it,” but Fillmore would “Open Pandora’s Box,” if the city delved into the business.

According to research, usage has increased 74 percent for Colorado youth, 20 percent of infants born in the state have THC in their blood, and the daily use of marijuana said Dean, “Increases the chance of psychosis” in youth.

“I’m not sure if the family values that Fillmore is built on,” he added,

“is what you really want to do here...”

Fillmore Police Chief Dave Warcham told the council he traveled to Colorado and Washington State to see the impact of legal marijuana firsthand.

“If everybody follows the rules, the system works,” without a problem.

But, he added, “The reality is there is a whole industry out there that is not going to follow those rules. The lesson I learned is we’re not ready.”

Public speakers in turn urged the council to consider opening the city to medical marijuana operations and others saying they are opposed.

The council will reconsider its ban at its August 9 meeting.

Martinez to face felony charges

Ventura County District Attorney Greg Totten announced Tuesday that his office would not file a second-degree murder charge against a Santa Paula man involved in a July 22 police pursuit that led to the death of an 80-year-old motorcyclist.

Ventura Police had arrested Victor Antonio Giovanni Martinez of Santa Paula for second-degree murder in connection with the hit and run death of Richard Lunsford of Ventura, whose Harley Davidson motorcycle was allegedly struck by Martinez’s vehicle as it exited Highway 126 at a high rate of speed and ran a red light.

Martinez had been involved in a police pursuit that started when his vehicle collided with an unmarked

Ventura Police patrol car carrying several detectives while traveling westbound on Highway 126 Friday mid-afternoon.

Martinez, who had been out on bail pending an unrelated criminal case, failed to stop when a marked Ventura Police patrol vehicle attempted to pull him over as he exited Highway 126 at Kimball Road.

Martinez allegedly traveled through a red light and collided with three vehicles, including the fatal collision with Lunsford’s motorcycle, before continuing south of Kimball Road.

Martinez abandoned his vehicle while it was still moving and fled on foot, dropping the firearm along the way before convincing an unsuspecting motorist that he had been injured in a fall and needed a ride.

The vehicle was spotted later

and Martinez was finally taken into custody without further incident.

The July 22 pursuit and crash occurred on Martinez’s 24th birthday.

Totten’s announcement noted that charges filed against Martinez include suspicion of felony vehicular manslaughter, felony hit and run causing death, felony evading an officer causing death and a felony count of carrying a loaded, unregistered, firearm in a vehicle, among other charges as well as a special allegation.

Martinez is a documented gang member who reportedly was involved in a domestic dispute before the incident occurred.

In court Tuesday Martinez’s \$1-million-plus bail was reduced to \$500,000.

If convicted of the charges filed by the District Attorney Martinez would face a maximum possible sentence of 16 years in prison.

SPFD, VC Hazardous Waste responds to find of suspicious bottle in alley

Although officials so far have been unable to identify a liquid found in a bottle Saturday afternoon, an incident that caused a response from Santa Paula Fire, which summoned the Ventura County Hazardous Material Team to the scene.

The July 23 incident, according to the Ventura County Fire Department, occurred at about 5 p.m. near the intersection of Stanford and Ventura streets just north of Harvard Boulevard.

Santa Paula Fire had responded for an investigation and once on scene found a clear, five-gallon water bottle, it's top appearing to be sealed with tape, in an alley. The bottle was approximately one-quarter full with a yellowish liquid, and there appeared to be a white substance coating the sides of the bottle.

The homeowner of the adjacent property was interviewed and said the container was not there in the morning and that there was no possibility it belonged to his family or any of his workers.

Further testing by the VCFD Hazardous Material Team, which suited up in protective clothing and equipment before handling the bottle, determined that the contents were non-flammable, not a corrosive, oxidizer, or protein or natural product. They also ruled out methamphetamine.

They found the material was not volatile, petroleum based or radioactive but what it was could not be determined.

Since the product could not be positively identified it being a hazard could not be ruled out and it was deemed that the find be treated as hazardous waste.

Santa Paula Public Works, according to Interim Director Brian Yanez, picked up the bottle for further testing and disposal.

The public is asked to report any material they suspect is hazardous so experts can determine its potential for harm.

CARL plays it forward, sheltering dogs evacuated from Sand Canyon Fire

CARL (Canine Adoption & Rescue League) played it forward this week by accepting 26 pitbulls evacuated from Linda Blair WorldHeart Foundation (LBWHF), located in the path of the raging Sand Canyon Fire.

Sharon Clark of CARL said Tuesday that SPART, a rescue in the Los Angeles area, brought the dogs to the 901 Mission Rock Road facility after sending a truck to Blair's shelter where 82 dogs had to be evacuated.

"They sent a transport truck initially loading up 82 dogs, but with the change in the fire direction they left 20 at WorldHeart, a manageable number," in case a mandatory evacuation was called for.

"They delivered some to other rescues and then some to CARL." With its own population of 67 shelter dogs, the 26 pit bulls fit right in said Clark.

"It's a rescue to rescue thing... and the first thing that came to my mind," was the November 2014 Santa Clara Waste Water-Green Compass chemical explosions and fire that caused havoc at the CARL facility, close to the 3:45 a.m. incident.

Dozens were injured and disabled due to chemical exposure; the initial explosion created a vapor cloud that burst into flames about four hours later, a fire that caused a SCWW storage building containing sulfuric acid to explode.

Evacuations within one-mile were ordered, those within three miles were told to shelter in place and the decision was made that the fire would have to burn itself out.

After a standoff between county officials who feared for the safety of public safety responders as well as for volunteers, nearly 60 canines from CARL were finally moved the next afternoon to Balcom Canyon Lodge in Somis, transported in trailers and pickups to be fed, groomed and examined for exposure to fumes.

Said Clark Tuesday, "When I got the call about WorldHeart I thought yes, this our chance to be a help," in an emergency just as Balcom Canyon Pet Lodge had helped CARL.

The pit bulls now being lodged at CARL are "Beautiful dogs, very social," who have adjusted well to their new location.

Clark said Wednesday the dogs will be staying probably through the weekend as wind shifts flirt with flames.

"WorldHeart matched up the dogs to make sure they came with their best buddies...we knew who liked who," said Clark of CARL's pit bull guests.

Located in Acton, the Linda Blair WorldHeart Foundation was founded by the Oscar nominated actress to bring much needed attention to the growing problems related to animal welfare.

serves a four-year term and is compensated with a \$300 monthly stipend as well as more than \$1,000 each month that can be used for the city's cafeteria health plan, private insurance or pocketed.

Deputy City Clerk Lucy Blanco also pulled papers to run for the City Clerk seat now held by Judy Rice, whose second term is coming to an end.

City Treasurer Sandy Easley, the city's finance director, is also up for reelection and she pulled nomination papers, as did newcomer Rod Baltazar.

There are also two new potential candidates for the Santa Paula Unified School District Board of Trustees, Tim Hicks, who had served on the Santa Paula

Elementary School Board before the districts melded two years ago, and retired schoolteacher and administrator Jeri Mead. There are two other newcomers, Pamela Thompson, also a retired schoolteacher, who pulled nomination papers for a SPUSD seat and Derek Luna, a teacher and coach. Hicks is currently serving on the Blanchard Community Library Board of Trustees.

Incumbents Michelle Kolbeck, Kelsey Stewart, Christina "Tina" Urias and Board Chair Chris Wilson all pulled papers for the five-person board. Incumbent Diana Ponce-Gomez has not yet pulled papers.

The district will have a rare five-member race with the terms

of all incumbents ending at the same time, the result of the unification of the high school and elementary school districts. The highest three vote getters will serve full four-year terms with the two runner-ups serving two-year terms. Those elected to the short terms will be required to run again in two years, but for full four-year terms, to ensure the board terms are staggered.

Briggs School District, which includes Briggs and Oliveland schools, has two incumbents whose terms are ending, Victoria Jump and Colleen Garmon-Smith, the latter who has pulled

nomination papers.

Mupu School District has one trustee whose term will be up, Steven Jenkins, who has pulled nomination papers. There is also one trustee, Jason D. Duque, whose term is expiring on the board of the Santa Clara School District a.k.a. The Little Red Schoolhouse.

There are three incumbents on the Blanchard Community

Library Board whose terms are also up: first-term trustees Maureen Coughlin and Linda Spink and longtime board member Beverly Mueller.

Candidates have until August 12 to return nomination forms; if an incumbent fails to file the nomination/filing period will be extended five days to August 17.

The Presidential-General Election will be held November 8.

Not only did she create ripples but she was actually helping the poor and the dying. She thought; the poor the forgotten should at least be able to die with dignity. She saw the problem, she prayed about it and she acted it. She didn't ask, why doesn't someone do something?

It may be that in many cases we can't do something directly. Perhaps we cannot fix the traffic signal. But perhaps at, least we can cast a stone and create ripples.

In the meantime, we all have the opportunity and the responsibility to be part of a solution and not just a complaining spectator in our community.

Our Gospel reading for Sunday (Luke 12:13-21) is the

Parable of the Rich Fool. Jesus tells this parable in response to someone coming to him with a request motivated by greed. In the parable, a very wealthy man is focused on increasing his wealth. When he does so, he then becomes focused on doing whatever is necessary to protect and maintain that wealth. Needing more storage space for his crops, the source of his wealth, he tears down all his barns and builds even larger barns to house what he has accumulated. Satisfied with his success, he now has time to relax a little and enjoy the (literal) fruits of his labor.

And then comes the zinger. God informs the rich man that it is too late. God says to the man, “You fool! This very night your life is being demanded of you.” Then Jesus adds this admonition to his listeners (and us readers) – “So it is with those who store up treasures for themselves but are not rich toward God.”

This parable is sometimes interpreted as meaning that wealth is bad. But the reality is, we do need to amass a certain amount of wealth. We need to gain some wealth to support ourselves and our families in our day-to-day lives. We need to store up treasures in the form of our IRAs and 401(k)s to provide for our needs when we are older and no longer able to work. These are not bad things. They are actually pretty wise things to do.

The rich man was not a bad person because he amassed wealth. The problem is that he did so to the exclusion of all else. Amassing wealth was his sole focus. Even to the point of neglecting his relationship with God. What Jesus is getting at is really about balance. We are not to focus solely and exclusively on wealth. Particularly not when it is used solely for our own use. We are also to pay attention to our relationship with God. To work to develop that relationship. To live in accordance with God's commandments.

And yes, that does mean use of some of our resources to help those whom God cares about so deeply – the poor, the widow, the orphan, the marginalized. God loves and cares for the least of our sisters and brothers. But God relies on us to be his hands and his feet to do so. He relies on us to be his wallets to do so. Wealth is not bad in and of itself. What makes it good or bad is what we do – or don't do – with it.

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

SPFD Engine 82 part of VC Strike Team dispatched to raging Sand Fire

The Sand Fire will soon become one for the record books when it comes to unpredictability when the blaze broke out in Los Angeles County consuming thousands of acres in a matter of hours and taking twists and turns that surprised even seasoned firefighters.

The blaze brought mutual aid from several states as well as fire departments throughout California, including a Ventura County Strike Team that utilized Santa Paula Fire personnel, called out to respond to the Sand Fire in a hot hurry.

At 65 percent containment as of Thursday morning, the massive Sand Fire charred 38,346 acres

— nearly 60 square miles — in the Santa Clarita area after it broke out Friday, June 22, in the afternoon.

According to SPFD Assistant Chief Mike LaPlant, on Sunday, July 24,

“Santa Paula Engine 82 was dispatched as part of an ‘immediate need’ Strike Team,” consisting of five engines and a Strike Team Leader, directly to the fire at 4:45 p.m.

Captain Gil Segovia, Engineer Terry Bell and Firefighter Bryan Eaton staffed Santa Paula Engine 82 dispatched to the raging Sand Fire as part of the team.

“This Strike Team was made up of multiple fire agencies from across the county,” including the cities of Ventura, Oxnard which

sent two engines, and Naval Base Ventura County.

“Upon their arrival, they went right into ‘structure protection’ along Sand Canyon Road.”

La Plant said the team “continued with that assignment throughout the night until relieved by a fresh Strike Team mid-morning,” on July 25.

“They rested and were scheduled to return to the line at 6 p.m. that same day...the arrival of additional resources to the fire through the day allowed many of these ‘immediate need’, mutual aid resources to be released back to their home agencies,” and SPFD Engine 82 and the balance of the Strike Team were released that evening at about 10:30 p.m.

Santa Paula Engine 82 arrived

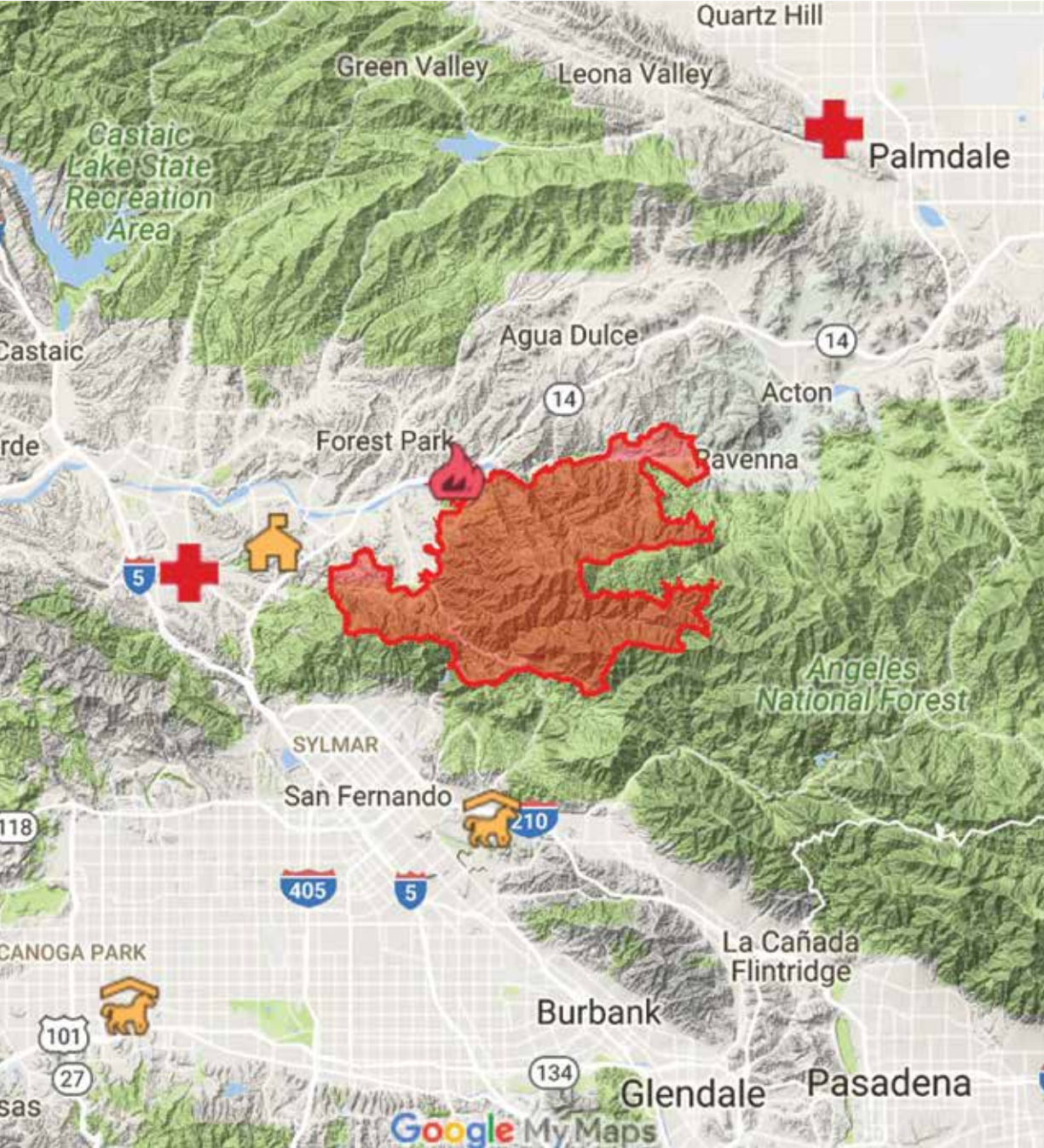
back home by midnight.

In all, more than 2,700 firefighters from multiple agencies are working day and night to calm

the blaze, which quickly exploded when it first broke out. Other resources battling the fire include 214 engines, 63 hand crews, 11

water tenders, 20 helicopters and 35 dozers.

One person was killed in the fire and 18 homes destroyed.
