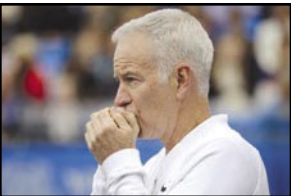
Jackson, Knicks end rocky union

Runner chose Sacramento over UNR, Fullerton

PALMDALE — Quartz Hill High School graduate Shilah Bedingfield exudes confidence in practically everything she does. No matter how fast she ran as a sprinter, or how many races and awards she won, Bedingfield made a habit of constantly projecting greatness. Even in conversation, Bedingfield speaks as though she knows exactly who she is and where she’s going. But when it came to choosing a college, some of that confidence shrunk. It wasn’t that Bedingfield didn’t get any offers. She received multiple, mostly from Division 1 programs. The problem was none her three final choices — University of Nevada, Reno, Cal State Fullerton and Sacramento State University — initially didn’t jump out at her enough. “I was stuck. I didn’t know where to go,” Bedingfield said as she sat at a table inside a Starbucks. “Honestly, my mom could’ve chose for me and I would’ve been good. That’s how bad it was.” Bedingfield eventually chose Sacramento State, where she received a 75% scholarship to compete in the 200 and 400. But getting to that decision was arduous, and took some creative problem-solving.

Paul joining Harden in Houston

Blockbuster trade sends seven players, draft pick to Clippers

HOUSTON — Chris Paul is heading to Houston to join James Harden, giving the Rockets two All-Stars in the backcourt to lead their chase for a championship. In the NBA’s second blockbuster trade in less than a week, the Rockets acquired Paul from the Los Angeles Clippers on Wednesday in exchange for Patrick Beverley, Lou Williams, Sam Dekker, Montrezl Harrell, Darrun Hilliard, DeAndre Liggins, Kyle Wiltjer, a protected first-round pick next year and cash considerations. The Rockets acquired Hilliard from Detroit and Liggins from Dallas for cash considerations before adding them to the deal. “It’s a weapons race in the NBA and you’re either in the weapons race or on the sidelines,” Houston general manager Daryl Morey said. “We felt like with James Harden in his prime and Chris Paul in his prime this gives us a real shot to chase the juggernaut teams that are out there. This puts us right there with them.” Both the Clippers and Houston will look far different next season than they did in again falling short in the playoffs. The roster overhauls came five days after Minnesota sent three players to Chicago for All-Star Jimmy Butler to kick things off with NBA free agency opening Saturday. The 32-year-old Paul will be playing for his third team after opting in for the last year of his contract so the Clippers could work on a deal. Morey wanted to get this deal done early so Paul could help Harden woo free agents to

Houston. “Now that we have James and Chris I think people are going to look in free agency and say: ‘Hey I can make this money there but maybe for close to the money but not quite as much I’m going to come to Houston and try to win a ring,’” he said. “So that’s a big difference walking in with that kind of a situation.”

Paul is a nine-time All-Star who has averaged 18.7 points, 9.9 assists, 4.4 rebounds and 2.3 steals over his 12-year career, though he has been dogged with criticism in recent years for failing to help the Clippers get out of the second round of the playoffs. Los Angeles reached the postseason in each of Paul’s six seasons with the team, but the Clippers were eliminated in the first round three times and in the Western Conference semifinals three other times. Perhaps the most crushing playoff series loss of his tenure with the Clippers came to the Rockets in 2015. Los Angeles had a 3-1 lead in the conference semifinals before Houston won the last three games of the series to send Paul and the Clippers home early yet again. The Clippers were eliminated in the first round the past two seasons and Paul isn’t the only star who may be leaving. Blake Griffin informed the team last week that he is opting out of the last year of his contract to explore free agency. J.J. Redick also is a free agent. In Houston, Paul joins a team that was eliminated by the San Antonio Spurs in the conference semifinals. With Harden’s move to point guard last season, Paul’s role will probably be a bit different than it has been in Los Angeles. But he will add another scoring dimension in replacing Beverley in the starting lineup. Beverley received NBA defensive first team honors last week, but averaged just 9.3 points in his five seasons with the Rockets. Coach Mike D’Antoni knows the biggest question people have is how Harden and Paul will play together. But he isn’t worried about that and said it will be a joy to have both of them on his team. “You can sit around all day and say why it wouldn’t work, but it does because they want it to work,” D’Antoni said. “And I know James and Chris want it to work and that’s all it **See PAUL on C3**

America, never mind NASCAR Nation, never wanted to let go of Dale Earnhardt. So it hugged his namesake son close to it’s heart, for reassurance as much as protection. NASCAR’s Crown Prince completed NASCAR’s journey to the unimaginable heights his father made possible. Now Junior’s journey is coming to its own end, as hinted by the Coke Zero 400 July 4th weekend race at Daytona that signals the start of the second half of the Monster Energy NASCAR Cup season. Lopez ready to mentor, compete

Montero out with Chicago

WASHINGTON — Catcher Miguel Montero says the Chicago Cubs are letting him go, one day after he blamed pitcher Jake Arrieta for allowing seven stolen bases in a game.

Montero posted a series of tweets Wednesday saying goodbye to fans and the city of Chicago and said on WMVP-AM radio that the Cubs had called to tell him they were designating him for assignment. The team had not announced any moves by early afternoon.

“When the team is not playing well, it’s got to go somewhere and I hope I can be the blame and I hope the team will take off from now and I can be a blame for that,” Montero said.

Montero said he called Arrieta to apologize and that the right-hander was “totally cool” about the situation, understanding that the comments were made in the heat of the moment after the Cubs’ 6-1 loss to the Washington Nationals on Tuesday night.

“It was an honor to play for the Chicago Cubs organization,” the 33-year-old tweeted . “Chicago will

always be in my heart.”

Montero will be remembered for a huge hit late in Game 7 of the World Series that ended the Cubs’ famous championship drought last fall. But tensions had been simmering since spring training over his role, and he has thrown out just one of 31 potential base stealers this season, hitting .286 with four home runs and eight RBIs in 44 games.

Still, the meltdown Tuesday night was unusually strong: Montero unloaded on Arrieta, saying the Nationals were running all over the right-handed ace who’s struggled of late because they knew he was slow to the plate with his delivery.

Trea Turner stole four bases, Michael Taylor two and Anthony Rendon one for a Montreal Expos/ Nationals franchise record. Montero had a throwing error that led to a run scoring.

“It really sucked because the stolen bases go to me, and when you really look at it, the pitcher doesn’t give me any time,” Montero said. “So it’s just like, ‘Yeah, OK, Miggy can’t throw nobody out,’ but

my pitcher doesn’t hold anybody on.”

First baseman Anthony Rizzo said on WMVP that Montero’s comments were unprofessional and not acceptable.

“We win as a team, we lose as a team,” Rizzo said. “If you start pointing fingers, I think that just labels you as a selfish player. I disagree. I think we have another catcher that throws out anyone who steals.”

Willson Contreras has thrown out 16 of 31 potential base stealers this season and is the Cubs’ starting catcher. After the game, manager Joe Maddon said Arrieta and Montero working together was “an imperfect situation.”

“It’s not about the move to first; it’s about time to the plate more than anything,” Maddon said. “He’s a little bit slow... It’s something that he works on. There are times he’s quicker or better with it, but guys like Turner who are premier runners, it’s really difficult to get down to the number that makes it amenable even for a Willson. The best antidote is to keep that guy off the base.”

WASHINGTON — President Donald Trump welcomed manager Joe Maddon and the Chicago Cubs into the Oval Office on Wednesday, their second visit to the White House in eight months since winning the World Series.

Trump entertained the Cubs in an informal visit Maddon said was set up by the team’s owners, the Ricketts family, which donated millions of dollars to his campaign. The Cubs were honored as World Series champions by President Barack Obama in his last week in office in January.

“This is a great team and they were actually here but they wanted to be here with Trump, right?” Trump said. “I just want to thank and I want to congratulate them.”

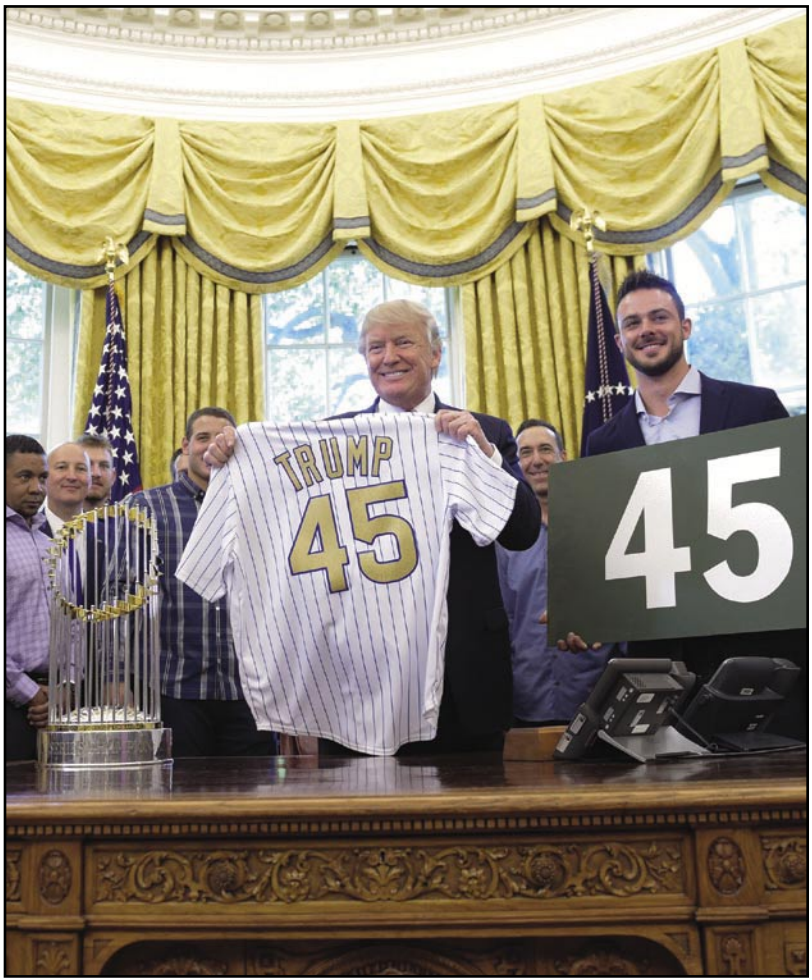
Along with Maddon and Tom and Todd Ricketts, several players made the trip to the White House, including first baseman Anthony Rizzo, pitcher Jon Lester, third baseman Kris Bryant and outfielder Albert Almora Jr. Trump took photos with the World Series trophy and a Cubs jersey with his name and No. 45 — he is the 45th president — in gold on the back.

Maddon said Trump was complimentary in their “very, very quick” visit and that the pictures will be entertaining to show his grandchildren. General manager Jed Hoyer called it a “pretty cool life experience.”

“It’s always an honor when you get asked to go to the White House,” Hoyer said before the Cubs’ game against the Washington Nationals. “Regardless of your politics, it’s a place that all Americans should be impressed by.”

Almora laughed off a picture that made it looked like he was giving Trump the middle figure, saying, “There was definitely two fingers out there.”

“It is not every day you get to meet the President of the United States,” Almora said. “To meet two in one calendar year . it was pretty

special for me.”

When Trump asked members of the Cubs how the Nationals were doing, Rizzo invited him to the game Wednesday night down the street at Nationals Park. Todd Ricketts, who withdrew his name from consideration after being Trump’s pick as deputy commerce secretary, said, “We’re going to run into these guys in the playoffs you come down and you’ll see them crumble.”

The division-leading Nationals have lost in the first round of the

playoffs in each of their three trips since 2012. The Cubs entered the day one game above .500, so Hoyer wasn’t in the mood to add another bulletin-board quote.

“We’ve got to worry about our own house right now,” Hoyer said.

Also in the room for Trump’s photo-op with the Cubs were Cleveland Cavaliers owner Dan Gilbert and Indiana Sen. Dan Coats, who called himself a “die-hard” fan. Hoyer said there weren’t a lot of private moments like during Obama’s visit.

Signs are good for sports betting

LAS VEGAS — Jimmy Vaccaro has been taking bets in this gambling town for more than 40 years, so there's not much he won't put a price on.

That includes the chances of the U.S. Supreme Court opening the door to legalization of sports betting across the country — something Vaccaro couldn't have imagined in 1976 when he first set up a sports book just off the glittering Las Vegas Strip.

"I make it an 8-5 favorite," said Vaccaro, who operates the sports book at the South Point resort. "I feel good about it."

For once there are some things to feel good about in the push to allow more Americans to do what people in Las Vegas have been doing on a regular basis ever since the point spread was invented — put a few dollars on their favorite team.

What was once no more than a distant fantasy edged a bit closer to reality Tuesday when the Supreme Court agreed to hear New Jersey's bid to allow sports betting at casinos and racetracks in the state. That the court even agreed to weigh in on the case was cheered as a victory from a sports betting industry that has long been eager to expand outside Nevada.

"It would be a monster step for us," Vaccaro said.

Monster step might be an understatement. The legal sports books in

Nevada took in a record \$4.5 billion in wagers last year, and it's anyone's guess how many more billions would be in play if some big states like New Jersey or New York get into the act.

And, really, it's way past time. Nevada has shown in recent years that sports betting — if properly regulated — is no threat to either Americans with a few bucks in their pocket or the teams they bet on. Even the major sports leagues have come to accept — and even embrace — sports betting, though for some reason they are still fighting New Jersey's efforts to get a piece of the action.

It's a far cry from when Vaccaro was making book at the Royal Inn

in the 1970s and sports betting was widely seen as both morally wrong and a threat to the country's sports institutions. "There's this black cloud from people who don't understand the industry that they keep throwing over us," Vaccaro said. "It's not fair. It's not really fair. They talk about fixed games but my answer is always this: I bet you there's more politicians in jail than bookmakers."

The case the Supreme Court will likely hear in the fall is centered around New Jersey's attempt to save struggling casinos and racetracks by offering single-game sports betting, prohibited everywhere but Nevada under a 1992 federal law. The four major sports leagues and the NCAA

sued in 2012 after the state passed a law to allow the betting, and until the Supreme Court unexpectedly agreed to hear the case it looked as if the New Jersey effort was dead.

That hasn't stopped the American Gaming Association — a casino industry group — from pushing for federal legislation to legalize sports betting, an idea that has received a lot of new interest in the wake of the explosion of the daily fantasy industry, which is basically sports betting under another name.

What will be interesting as the New Jersey case goes before the Supreme Court are the actions of the plaintiffs themselves. A lot has changed in the five years since the leagues and the NCAA filed suit, with NBA Commissioner Adam Silver now on record as saying legal betting is good for the league and the NFL allowing the Raiders to move to a state where sports betting is legal with no restrictions on betting on the team.

What the leagues really should be doing instead of wasting resources on policies of the past is getting together with all interested parties, including the sports betting industry, and helping draft legislation for Congress to allow legal sports betting in states that want it.

Put in the necessary controls, and establish a way for them to be enforced across different states. Give states the option of opting out, and carve out some restrictions on betting college games in states where betting becomes legal.

Knicks, Phil Jackson part ways

NEW YORK — Phil Jackson wanted to trade Carmelo Anthony and wouldn't rule out dealing Kristaps Porzingis.

Turns out, Jackson is the one leaving.

Jackson is out as New York Knicks president after he oversaw one of the worst eras in team history, with the team saying in a statement Wednesday that they had "mutually agreed to part company."

Days after Jackson reiterated his desire to move Anthony and said he would listen to deals for Porzingis, Madison Square Garden chairman James Dolan reversed course and cut ties with Jackson with two years remaining on his contract.

"After careful thought and consideration, we mutually agreed that the Knicks will be going in a different direction," Dolan said. "Phil Jackson is one of the most celebrated and successful individuals in the history of the NBA. His legacy in the game of basketball is unmatched."

But his work as a first-time executive was awful. The winner of an NBA-record 11 championships as coach, Jackson couldn't engineer one playoff berth while running the Knicks. The team was 80-166 in his three full seasons, including a franchise-worst 17-65 in 2014-15.

His departure was quickly welcomed by Knicks fans such as film director Spike Lee, who posted a picture of himself on Instagram in a celebratory pose after it was first reported by The Vertical.

The move comes less than a week after Jackson led the Knicks through the NBA draft and on the eve of free agency that opens Saturday. Dolan said he would not be involved in the operation of the team, adding that general manager Steve Mills would run the day-to-day business in the short term and that former Toronto executive Tim Leiweke would advise him and help develop a plan going forward.

Jackson was a Hall of Fame

coach with the Chicago Bulls and Los Angeles Lakers, delivering titles with some of the game's biggest stars like Michael Jordan, Shaquille O'Neal and Kobe Bryant. He also played for the Knicks when they won NBA titles in 1970 and 1973.

He was welcomed back to the organization with a \$60 million contract to huge fanfare in March 2014, but it soon became clear the transition would be a poor one. His first coaching hire, Derek Fisher, lasted just 1½ seasons, and Jackson's trades and free agency moves also failed to improve the club.

"I had hoped, of course, to bring another NBA championship to the Garden. As someone who treasures winning, I am deeply disappointed that we weren't able to do that," Jackson said. "New York fans deserve nothing less. I wish them and the Knicks organization all the best — today and always."

The turbulence he created off the court may have led to his departure more than the Knicks' record on it.

Jackson publicly talked about moving without Anthony — angering the National Basketball Players Association — though the All-Star forward has two years left on the five-year, \$124 million deal that Jackson gave him shortly after taking the job. Anthony has a no-trade clause and has said he wants to stay in New York, and the stalemate that hung over the team for much of last season threatened to linger throughout the summer.

Then Jackson said before the draft that he was listening to offers for Porzingis, the 21-year-old forward from Latvia whom he drafted with the No. 4 pick in 2015 in one of his few successful moves.

Coach Jeff Hornacek, in Orlando with the Knicks' team preparing for summer league, thanked Jackson for bringing him to New York last summer.

"It's a tough day for us but our group, really our focus is to get this team better, continue to build our young players and figure out a way to win," Hornacek said. "We have a

lot of time before the regular season and we will figure that out."

Jackson believed the Knicks would compete for a playoff berth last season after he traded for Derrick Rose, signed Joakim Noah and Courtney Lee and hired Hornacek. But after a solid start, they quickly spiraled toward their familiar position at the bottom of the Eastern Conference and finished 31-51.

Despite all that, Dolan said during an ESPN Radio interview in February that he would allow Jackson to finish his contract, and the sides picked up the mutual two-year option on Jackson's contract.

But the instability involving Anthony and Porzingis threatened to damage the team's ability to lure free agents and may have spurred Dolan's decision. Though he had been intent on keeping Jackson, the dysfunction within the franchise showed no sign of ending even as Jackson, 71, largely stayed out of sight.

He never spoke to the media last season after vowing openness upon taking the job and refused to provide Anthony with the communication he sought.

"It's like a total train wreck," tennis great and Knicks fan John McEnroe told The Associated Press last week.

"I mean, he's known as the Zen Master, like a master talker, and then he's not talking to anybody," McEnroe said of Jackson. "So this whole thing seems to have gone completely off the rails."

There was also incessant debate about Jackson's insistence that the team employ the triangle offense, which potential incoming players were schooled on during the run-up to last week's draft. The Knicks wound up taking 18-year-old French point guard Frank Ntilikina, who spoke highly of the triangle and Jackson's belief in the scheme.

"I think I can definitely fit with this system," Ntilikina said on draft night.

Not even a week later, the triangle is probably gone, and the Knicks will start anew.

Ice Cube chillin', waiting for Billups to make decision

CLEVELAND — Ice Cube is chilling as he waits for Chauncey Billups to make a move.

The rapper-turned-basketball mogul said Wednesday that he doesn't know if Billups will join Cleveland's front office and lead the Cavaliers' basketball operations. Last week, Cube, who co-founded Big3, a new 3-on-3 league featuring former NBA players, said he was certain Billups was taking a job with the Cavs and wished him well in his new endeavor.

However, Billups, a five-time All-Star guard, remains undecided about leaving his TV analyst job and uprooting his family in Denver to start anew in Cleveland.

"We'll find out I guess pretty soon here," Cube said Wednesday in New York. "We hope he'd play in the Big 3 of course, but we wish him well if he decides to take the job in Cleveland. Our league is player friendly in every way you could think about. So we want him to be happy and successful in whatever he do."

Billups met twice last week with Cleveland owner Dan Gilbert about a future with the club. They've known each other for a decade and Gilbert is looking for someone to oversee the Cavaliers' front office after general manager David Griffin parted ways with the team following three straight trips to the NBA Finals.

The 40-year-old Billups lacks front-office experience, but he's well connected in the league and has an excellent reputation.

Gilbert was at the White House on Wednesday. He posed for photos with President Donald Trump and the Chicago Cubs, who were in

Washington playing the Nationals and visited the White House to celebrate winning their first World Series title in 108 years last season.

Gilbert and Quicken Loans CEO Jay Farner were at the White House to speak with Trump about the turnaround they've helped in Detroit.

Cube's 3-on-3 venture tipped off last weekend and he's hoping that if Billups doesn't join the Cavaliers, he will play for one of the league's eight teams.

"He's one of the first guys to sign with us, so we really would love to see him in that Killer 3 Mr. Big Shot jersey with the No. 1 on it," Cube said.

Rockets add Paul, Morey wants more

Throughout Daryl Morey's tenure as general manager of the Houston Rockets, he's abided by a clear, simple game plan: collect talent, and figure out the rest.

The Rockets have plenty of figuring out to do.

There's little doubt the trade Morey pulled off Wednesday — moving guards Patrick Beverley and Lou Williams, forwards Sam Dekker and Montrezl Harrell, a protected 2018 first-round pick and some still-being-collected non-guaranteed salaries, to the Los Angeles Clippers for superstar point guard Chris Paul as sources confirmed to The Washington Post — is a coup for Morey and the Rockets. The move will pair Paul with James Harden to form one of the most lethal partnerships in the NBA.

But in making the move, Morey is pushing his game plan to the limit, as the fit between Paul and Harden, between Paul and Rockets Coach Mike D'Antoni, will be fascinating to watch. It also means something else: the Rockets aren't done chasing talent this summer.

On the surface, Paul and Harden are an awkward fit. Both pound the ball into the ground

— Harden ranked first in time of possession and Paul seventh, per SportVU tracking data — and are used to having complete control of their teams. But that ignores the fact both Paul and Harden have clearly chosen this as the best path forward for each of them.

Harden, who finished as a runner-up for the NBA's MVP award for the second time in three seasons, campaigned for Paul to join him in Houston. In turn, Paul could have entered the free agent market and talk to multiple teams when he became a free agent on July 1, perhaps joining the San Antonio Spurs, who could use a point guard. By opting into his deal for next season and facilitating this trade, Paul made it clear he wanted to play for the Rockets — and, specifically, wanted to play with Harden.

That doesn't mean there won't be growing pains. This feels much more like Dwyane Wade and LeBron James teaming up with the Miami Heat in 2010 than Kevin Durant joining the Golden State Warriors last summer. Durant felt like he was created to play alongside Stephen Curry, Klay Thompson and Draymond Green; Wade and James, despite their close friendship, had to learn how to share the ball in order to make their partnership work.

And Paul, famously one of the most hard-driving players in the league when it comes to getting on his teammates, will no doubt be the first one to bark at Harden if he doesn't play at a much higher level defensively than in the past.

Then there is Paul's fit within D'Antoni's pace-and-space system. Paul loves to work out of the mid-range — a shot D'Antoni loathes — and prefers to play at a slower tempo and work the shot clock much more than D'Antoni teams typically do. But that, too, could prove to be a benefit for the Rockets. Anyone who saw how Houston's offense ground to a halt as its second-round series against the Spurs progressed, who saw how Harden completely ran out of gas, could see that having one eminently predictable way to play — no matter how effective it is — can be figured out over the course of a seven-game series against an elite team.

By adding Paul, Houston has created about as effective of a Plan B as it possibly could, allowing the Rockets to shift to a very different style of play when Harden is off the floor, and keeping an elite ball-handler on the floor for all 48 minutes each night.

But anyone who thinks Morey is satisfied with his team immediately following this trade is fooling

themselves. No one is more active, or tries to make more moves, than Morey, who has remarkably gone from the hot seat a year ago to resuming his spot as one of the most secure general managers in the league.

Given how insane this NBA off-season has already been (with the start of free agency still a few days away, no less), Morey has plenty of time, and plenty of reasons, to remain active. The biggest trade piece out there is Paul George, the Indiana Pacers star who has made it clear to management he will not be re-signing with them when he can enter free agency next summer. A Houston package frontlined by Eric Gordon, the newly minted Sixth Man of the Year on a fantastic contract (roughly \$13 million over the next three years) — and who played collegiately at Indiana University, to boot — could be enticing to the Pacers.

Plus, if anyone is willing to sacrifice assets for a chance at a star like George without any commitment for the future — believing he can convince said player to stick around — it is Morey. Remember his ethos: collect talent, and then figure out the rest.

Morey did that Wednesday, and now has a backcourt featuring Chris Paul and James Harden.

both schools offered Bedingfield a scholarship in February.

But Sacramento's sprint coach, Kimberly Graham-Miller, kept in constant contact with Bedingfield, which made her feel wanted, she said.

"It's almost like little marriage," Sacramento sprint coach Kimberly Graham-Miller said. "She's gonna be here. So you kinda gotta date each other a little bit to kinda see what kind of person are you. So we talk about different kind of things like track and what she wants to study and about her family. Me, personally, when I'm recruiting somebody, I just like to get to know what kind of person they are."

Because of Graham-Miller's diligence, Bedingfield felt that Sacramento was the school for her. She was all set to pick Sacramento in late May, but a call came from Fullerton, which greatly intrigued her.

Both Bedingfield's parents wanted her to attend Reno because its academic advisor assured them their daughter's schoolwork would not fall by the wayside. When Bedingfield asked her friends for their opinions, they all said she should choose Sacramento.

Then there was Fullerton. Bedingfield's teachers advised her to go there because the professors' connections could make it easier for her to obtain a job after gradu-

ating.

Bedingfield said she stayed up nights debating where she would go.

"It got really hard when Fullerton came," Bedingfield said. "I was...really torn because I really liked it."

Bedingfield went to her friend, Antelope Valley High School graduate Tyrese Dedmon, for help. He suggested she make a pros-and-cons to make her decision easier.

"She was stressing out," Dedmon said via direct message on Twitter.

Bedingfield took Dedmon's advice and made a list. She worked on it so much that she brought it to school and pored over her decision instead of doing work.

"I wasn't even paying attention to class at that time," Bedingfield said.

Her list, however, didn't move the needle as much as she'd hoped. All three schools essentially came out even, Bedingfield said.

So she created a points system to further help her decide.

The system was simple enough. Bedingfield listed a slew of categories that applied to all three schools and rated each of them on a five-point scale. Categories included coaches, teammates, area surrounding the school, quality of the track stadium, academic programs and others.

Bedingfield also included cat-

egories that would give bonus points for school colors, sponsors and whether or not the school had a football team.

When she tallied up the points, Reno won with 82, Fullerton had 78 and Sacramento came in last with 75.

Despite her valiant efforts, Shilah's systems still proved ultimately inconclusive.

Decision time

After three months of agonizing over which of the three schools she'd pick, and fielding daily inquiries from classmates and teaches about her decision, Bedingfield grew frustrated.

"Why does everyone seem to know where I'll go, but I don't?" she thought. So she made a choice, and stuck to it.

"I wanted to decide because I was tired of not knowing where I was going while everyone else did," Bedingfield said. "I was just tired of being totally indecisive about one of the biggest decisions of my life."

On a Monday afternoon, just a few days removed from her official visit to Cal State Fullerton, Bedingfield — just having finished track practice at Quartz Hill — went home, walked in her front door and declared to her mother that she was picking Sacramento State and wasn't changing her mind.

"It was like a relief," Bedingfield said of how she felt when she decided on Sacramento State. "I could finally sit back and breathe."

As Bedingfield thought about what factors led to her decision, it became clear that Sacramento State was always her first choice. She made the deepest connection with the coach there, she has a small network of people she knows there or in the area, and it was the perfect distance from home, she said.

Even as her point system rendered Sacramento last of the three choices, Bedingfield went back to find ways of awarding the school more points. Something in her gut, she said, was telling her Sacramento State all along.

It turned out that her decision had been made long before the sleepless nights, the lists and the doubts. But it seems Bedingfield just wanted to feel that familiar confidence in herself once again with a decision that would determine "the biggest four years" of her life.

"My gut feeling and everything was telling me Sacramento the whole time," Bedingfield said. "That's how I came to choose Sacramento. It was a long, hard process."

LeBron puts together NBA documentary for Showtime

CLEVELAND — LeBron James will help tell a story he's still shaping.

The Cavaliers superstar is teaming with Showtime on a documentary that will examine the modern NBA and the league's impact on popular culture. James, who has been producing TV and movie projects for several years, will serve as an executive producer with long-time business partner Maverick Carter.

The three-part documentary will be directed by filmmaker Gotham Chopra and premiere in 2018.

James has become one of the game's most transcendent players. The 32-year-old recently led Cleveland to its third straight Finals — his seventh consecutive trip. The three-time champion continues to play at an amazingly high level after 14 pro seasons.

"We developed the idea for these films because of the incredible, generational impact some of the NBA's most successful players have had on every aspect of American culture," said Carter, CEO of SpringHill Entertainment. "Gotham is the perfect filmmaker to bring these stories to life, and Showtime is the right platform to showcase how they were able to transcend the game and shape the culture in an unprecedented way."

Chopra previously produced and directed a successful documentary on Kobe Bryant.

"Despite the fact that I am a Boston Celtics fan to the bone, collaborating with Maverick and LeBron was an inspired opportunity," he said. "Sports in general and specifically the NBA provide a great backdrop for storytelling. But these films offer us a chance to go beyond that; to weave a broader cultural narrative in our current social climate."

Yet the Lakers also coveted Lopez for his size, veteran leadership and newly revealed 3-point shooting ability as they rebuild the franchise on the ruins of four consecutive losing seasons.

"He has adapted to the new style of play in the NBA," Lakers general manager Rob Pelinka said Wednesday while introducing Lopez at their training complex. "We don't see next year at all as a rebuilding year. We see it as a Lakers year, and a lot of that is going to be centered around (Lopez) and what he stands for, and what we know he'll give to this organization."

Lopez will be the Lakers' highest-paid player next season, but the North Hollywood native intends to do much more than collect a check before hitting free agency in 2018. Although he is moving from the NBA's worst team last season to another bottom-dweller, he sees potential and promise with coach Luke Walton and the Lakers' emerging core.

"It's an exciting time to be a part of this organization with all the young guys they've got," the 29-year-old Lopez said. "I'm just excited to be here and help teach them, to be that veteran presence in this organization. ... That being said, I'm not looking to just do that and do that only. I'm looking to help the team any way I can on the court, whatever they need done, however I fit into Luke's offense. I can be a guy the guys can rely on, an anchor in the paint, whether it's blocking shots or being on that help side. I'm going to do whatever it takes."

Lopez is likely to get plenty of

chances to shoot from the perimeter next season. He hit 134 3-pointers last year in Brooklyn after making just three in his first eight NBA seasons combined.

His emergence as a 3-point threat was one of the more unlikely developments in basketball last season, but the 7-footer says it was no surprise to him — and the Lakers want him to keep it up.

"Luke's system is predicated on having bigs that can stretch the floor and create space," Pelinka said. "Especially with Lonzo (Ball) and Jordan Clarkson as attack guards, and having bigs that can open up the floor and make plays, allow Brandon (Ingram) to kind of get in creases with Julius (Randle) running the floor, and Larry (Nance Jr.). I think it's a perfect fit, and I think he's the perfect road map to our next generation of centers here, too."

After coach Kenny Atkinson took over the Nets with a desire to have shooters at every position, Lopez had the mandate to let loose with the 3-pointers that have been a part of his offseason training regimen for several years. They've been part of his game for much longer, actually. While playing against his older brothers in the San Fernando Valley, he had to shoot from outside or they would simply block his shots.

"They weren't really nice older brothers," Lopez said with a grin.

Lopez already has a personal connection to one young Lakers forward: Nance dunked on Lopez spectacularly last season. Lopez acknowledges he thought Nance was robbed in the Dunk of the Year competition at the NBA awards show.

McEnroe scolded for Serena comment

Everywhere you look this week, there's John McEnroe, talking about how Serena Williams would be "like 700 in the world" if she played on the men's tennis circuit. You could call McEnroe's round of interviews an apology tour, except for one little thing.

He's still Johnny Mac. He isn't apologizing. He explained as much repeatedly in a series of appearances ever since his comment sparked a silly debate and even in the face of criticism within his own family.

"It didn't go over big with my daughters, either, okay?" he said when "The Late Show With Stephen Colbert" crowd booted a recap of his controversial NPR interview.

There are plenty of McWomen to object, too. There's Emily, his 26-year-old with ex-wife Tatum O'Neal, and daughters Anna, 21, and Ava, 18, and stepdaughter Ruby Myers with his wife, Patty Smyth. "You remember 'The Honeymooners' — Ralph Kramden — me and my big mouth! It's a little bit like that," McEnroe said. "Do they say that about girl basketball players, that they're as good as Michael Jordan?"

Gulp. "They might say 'women's basketball players,' " Colbert offered, to cheers.

And, no, he was offering no apology for the Serena comment, just as he had declined to do on "CBS This Morning."

"People always ask me, 'Can you beat Serena Williams?' " continued McEnroe, who in one of life's happy coincidences just happens to have that new book ("But Seriously") coming out. "My girls don't think I can beat her now. I thought I could beat her. She's pregnant, so maybe I should play her now. I'd have a better chance. But either way, I wish her the absolute best. She's the best thing that's happened to American tennis in the last 10, 15 years."

McEnroe triggered this angle of his a tour to promote his new book with his comment, which came in an interview with NPR's Lulu Garcia-Navarro. She took issue with McEnroe's qualifier in describing Williams as the best

female player in the world.

"Well, because if she was in, if she played the men's circuit she'd be like 700 in the world," McEnroe said. " . . . That doesn't mean I don't think Serena is an incredible player. I do, but the reality of what would happen would be I think something that perhaps it'd be a little higher, perhaps it'd be a little lower. And on a given day, Serena could beat some players. I believe because she's so incredibly strong mentally that she could overcome some situations where players would choke 'cause she's been in it so many times, so many situations at Wimbledon, The U.S. Open, etc. But if she had to just play the circuit - the men's circuit - that would be an entirely different story."
